




Standard Barrier Expectations





# Ostomy Tips for the Pool - Getting Into the Swim of Things

Can I go swimming with an ostomy? The answer is a resounding "YES!!!" Swimming is an excellent exercise—an opportunity for a good cardiovascular workout without overly stressing your joints or your spine. The pool is a great place to work on those range-of-motion exercises, the water helps support you while you move, and water exercises can be done in the deep end or while sitting in the shallow end of the pool. Best of all, swimming is an activity you can enjoy with family and friends of all ages and abilities!

So why are so many of us afraid to get back into the water? Here are some of our issues and solutions:

\*\*\*\* I'm afraid that my appliance will leak or come off while I'm in the pool. This is by far everyone's number one concern. The thing to remember is that your pouching system is designed to be leak-free and water-proof, and your wafer adhesive actually gets stronger in water. As long as your seal is strong and intact, strap on your swim fins and jump in.

TIP #1: Don't go swimming right after you've put on a new wafer.

TIP #2: Make sure your pouch is empty.

TIP #3: Picture framing your wafer with water-proof tape isn't necessary but may give you the extra confidence you need.

TIP #4: Avoid wearing pouches with filters into the pool. Water may get in through the filter.

\*\*\*\* I'm concerned that people will be able to see my pouching system under my bathing suit.

A dark colored suit with a busy pattern will camouflage your appliance better than light colors like white or yellow, which can become almost transparent when wet. Note: your pouch will dry just as quickly as your suit will, so no need to worry about a telltale damp spot.

TIP #1: For women, choose a suit with a small, well-placed ruffle or skirt.

TIP #2: For men, choose a suit with a higher cut waist or longer leg.

TIP #3: You may wish to wear a smaller, non-drainable pouch (those designed for intimate moments work well here, too!).

TIP #4: If you have a colostomy and you irrigate, you may try wearing a stoma cap while you swim.

\*\*\*\* I'm embarrassed about changing into/out of my bathing suit in the locker room and people noticing my ostomy appliance.

Some of us don't care who sees what, while others are more modest when it comes to who knows about our ostomies and pouching systems. If you're a little on the shy side don't let the possibility of problems arising when changing prevent you from an enjoyable afternoon swim with family or friends. *Continued on page 12* 



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1925 Ostomy Canada Connects Evolution of Governance of Ostomy Canada 1962 - present Prepared by the Bylaws Committee April, 2017 Ostomy support groups have been working together across North America for over 50 years to provide information and support to those people facing life after ostomy surgery. The decision-making processes have been constantly evolving so that our Chapters can continue to serve their communities. The discussions we are having right now are just the latest opportunity to ensure that we are governing ourselves as effectively as possible under the revised federal legislation. This history can be divided into four phases according to which set of laws governed us: 1962 – 1981 The Growth Phase. Forming new Chapters under US law. 1981 – 1997 The Independence Movement. Changing to Canadian jurisdiction. 1997 - 2014 UOAC. Operating completely independently under Canadian law. 2014 - Today Ostomy Canada. Reincorporated under revised Canadian law. In the last issue of Ostomy Canada Connects, we looked at the Independence Movement as UOAC shifted more of its emphasis towards Canada. In this issue, we continue the story of the evolution of governance of the independent United Ostomy Association of Canada. The conditions of membership changes several times during this period as the Member Chapters struggled to improve the effectiveness of governance. 1997. UOAC severed legal ties with UOA. 2000. Voting Memberships - Affiliated Chapters only. National Council amended the Bylaws to change the formula for weighted voting to favour larger chapters. Voting rights for satellites were eliminated. 2000. District Support Services (now Chapter Outreach Support Services). National Council approved the District Support Services Manual, in which they delegated many of their responsibilities for governance to the Chair of District Support Services, in particular the responsibility for the affiliation agreements with Chapters and Satellites. 2001. Non-voting outreach groups. National Council approved the creation of SASO, the first of several outreach groups that could be part of the national organization without having to go through the process of formal affiliation and participation in governance. Since then, other outreach groups have formed (20/40, Parents of Children with Ostomies, Youth Camp, Social Media Groups). In most cases, no membership dues were required to participate. 2012. Electronic meetings. New technology allowed for monthly Board and Staff meetings with a minor cost for an annual subscription for the software. 2013. Non-voting individual and corporate memberships. In anticipation of the impending federal legislation and the proposed changes to the rights of members, non-voting individual memberships and dues were eliminated and replaced by national supporters and their donations. 2013. Conditions of Membership. At the August 18, 2013 Board meeting, a motion to change the definition of member to an individual was approved by a vote of 5 against 2. No conditions of membership were defined in the motion. It was decided at the November 16, 2013 Board meeting to suspend any further decisions to change the membership structure until after receipt of the Certificate of Continuance from Industry Canada. 2014. UOAC re-incorporated under new federal legislation as Ostomy Canada. Next month, we will look at the efforts of UOAC to govern itself effectively under the revised Canada Not-for-profit Corporations Act of 2014. At the 2017 annual general meeting of National Council, the delegates representing the affiliated Member Chapters will decide on the next step in the evolution of governance as we constantly strive to improve its effectiveness in a changing world.



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TIP #1: Try to find a spot that's out of the way or less crowded or change and towel off in a convenient bathroom stall.

TIP #2: Put on a dry, oversized T-shirt as a cover-up while you change. TIP #3: A dry suit is easier to take off than a wet one. Relax by the side of the pool with a good book or a talkative friend before heading for the locker room. TIP #4: Wear your bathing suit under a jogging suit or sweat pants and don't worry about changing at all.

\*\*\*\* What about using the hot tub or Jacuzzi? Go ahead. Again, as long as your appliance seal is good and your pouch is empty you should have no problems with your ostomy.

General Tips:

Do some planning – you know your body better than anyone and how long after eating your ostomy starts to work.

Try to arrange your swimming for a time when your output will be minimal. If you are still concerned about entering the pool with your appliance, try this: put on your bathing suit, fill your bathtub with water and sit in it for half an hour. You'll feel more confident when you see there's no leakage. You'll also get to see what your suit (and your covered pouching system) look like wet.

A support garment or bike shorts under your suit or a snug, Lycra bathing suit can help to keep your pouching system in place and prevent your pouch and clip from migrating to the groin area. Some ostomates sew pockets into the inside of their suits as a way of providing additional pouch support, if needed. If you wear an ostomy belt, you should know that cloth belts stretch in the water – wear a rubber one if you want to wear a belt in the pool. Again, remember to get your doctor's okay before you take to the water or begin any strenuous exercise.

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# **Complications and Problems**

**Retracted Stomas** – A normal stoma has a slight protrusion from the skin level; this allows it to fit with ostomy appliances and the skin is protected from stoma output. Retraction is when the stoma is flush or below skin level. Sometimes the stoma may protrude when standing but disappear in the skin when sitting. Retraction is relatively common, with about 10 - 24% of stoma patients experiencing retraction. It's also more common with ileostomy than colostomy and tends to affect heavier (or obese) patients more frequently.

\*\*\*\*\*

Retracted stomas can cause problems with leaking with standard pouching systems. A retracted stoma is far more prone to leaks since the stoma outputs its contents directly to the skin. This can compromise the adhesives on barriers and cause skin irritation if not cleaned regularly. However, there are solutions to help prevent leakage and keep the skin clean and the barrier safe:

- *Convex Barriers/Wafers* The curved shape of the barrier helps the stoma protrude enough to keep the contents from leaking under the barrier.
- Ostomy Belt Helps support the barrier and the pouching system to prevent leaks by supporting the appliance around the waist.
- Adhesives Some barrier adhesives provide an extra tackiness that is far more waterproof; these
  adhesives can help prevent the skin and wafer to be compromised by leaks.Ostomy Guide, Learning about
